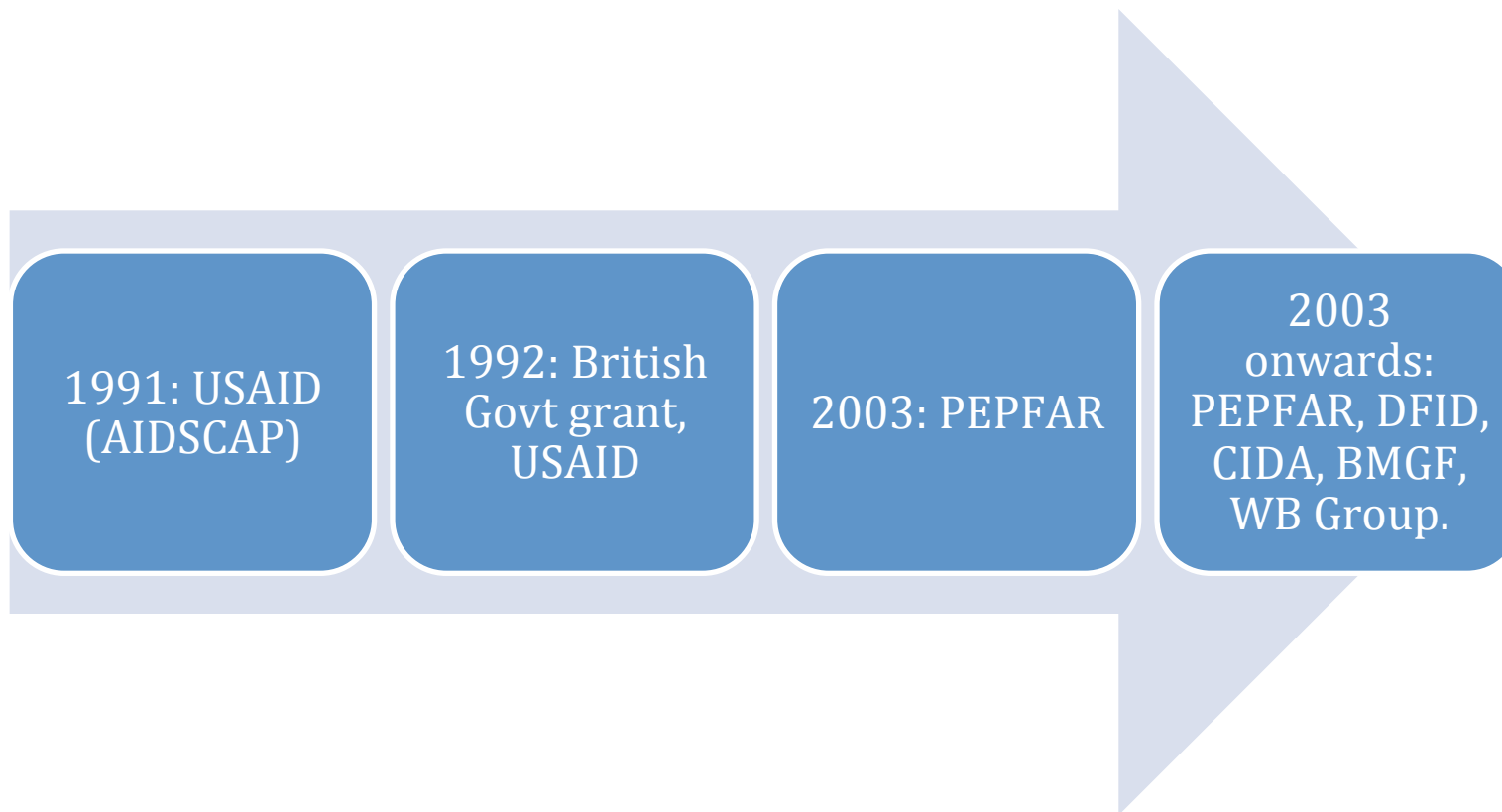


**Appendix 2:** Timeline of HIV funding by International donor agencies in Nigeria



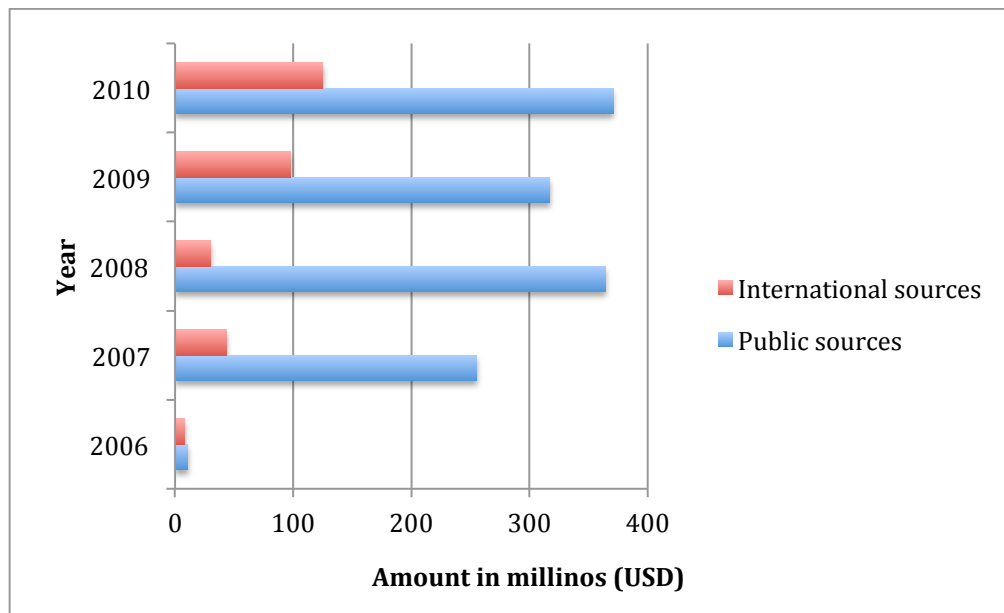
