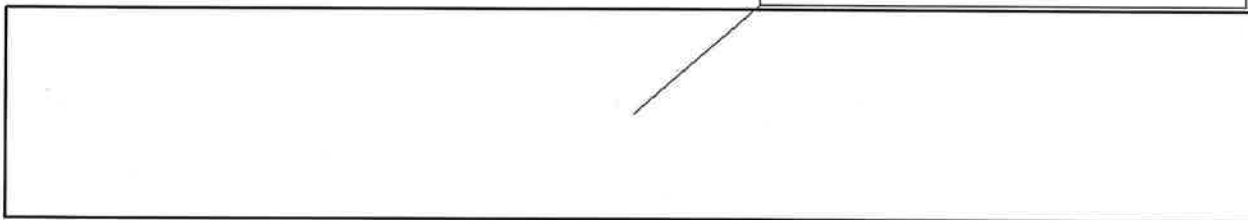

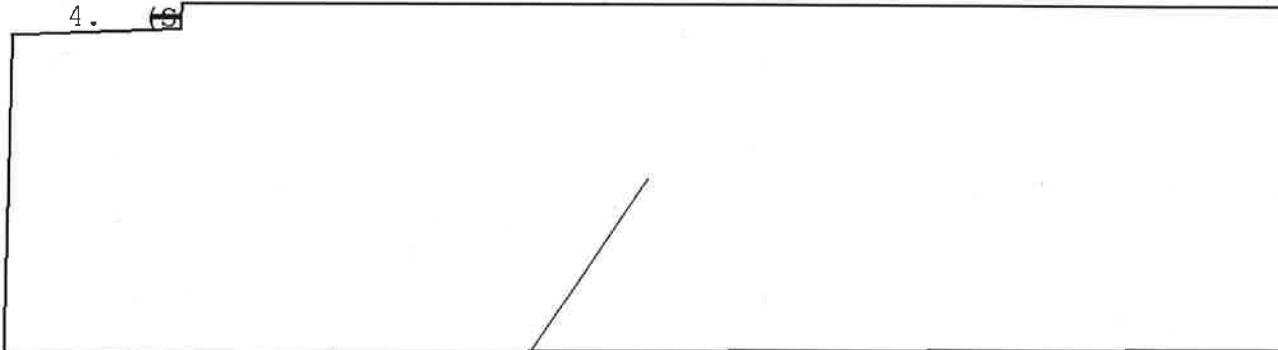

3. ~~(C/NF)~~ COMMENT: GUERRILLA ATTACKS AGAINST A SERIES OF SMALL TOWNS ALONG THE USULUTAN-SAN MIGUEL DEPARTMENTAL BOUNDARY OVER THE PAST SEVERAL MONTHS SUGGEST THE INSURGENTS HAVE BEEN TRYING TO CONSOLIDATE THIS KEY LOGISTICS CORRIDOR BY FORCING OUT LOCAL GOVERNMENT GARRISONS. REPORTING INDICATES AN INCREASED GUERRILLA PRESENCE AROUND JUCUAPA, CHINAMECA, EL TRANSITO, AND OTHER TOWNS ALONG THE CORRIDOR. THE NEARBY ROAD NETWORK FACILITATES MOVEMENT OF SUPPLIES BY VEHICLE, AN INSURGENT METHOD APPARENTLY ON THE RISE.

IN SELECTING THESE AREAS, THE GUERRILLAS EVIDENTLY HAVE TAKEN ADVANTAGE OF THE MILITARY*S WEAKNESS IN COORDINATING ACTIONS ALONG DEPARTMENTAL BOUNDARIES, WHICH IN THIS CASE ALSO DIVIDES THE 3D AND 6TH MILITARY ZONES.
