The Story.....

"The Portrait of Manon," Massenet's one-act sequel to his "Manon," appeared in 1894, ten years after the longer work. At the opening of the opera, des Grieux admires a small portrait of his sweetheart, Manon, and sings a bittersweet aria which sums up their tragic love. Determined to protect his nephew, Jean, from similar heartache, he refuses to consider his marriage to Aurore, a penniless young girl who is the pupil of Tiberge, des Grieux' lifelong friend. For a time, the young lovers contemplate suicide in the best adolescent tradition, but Aurore breaks the mood with her carefree ballad about the love of a shepherd. Eventually, Tiberge disguises Aurore as Manon when des Grieux first saw her. Seeing her at a distance, des Grieux believes it to be a vision of his lost love and Tiberge explains that Aurore is the daughter of Manon's brother. Des Grieux relents and blesses the union of the lovers with his realization the "reason is only a sacrilege . . . love is the truth."
