

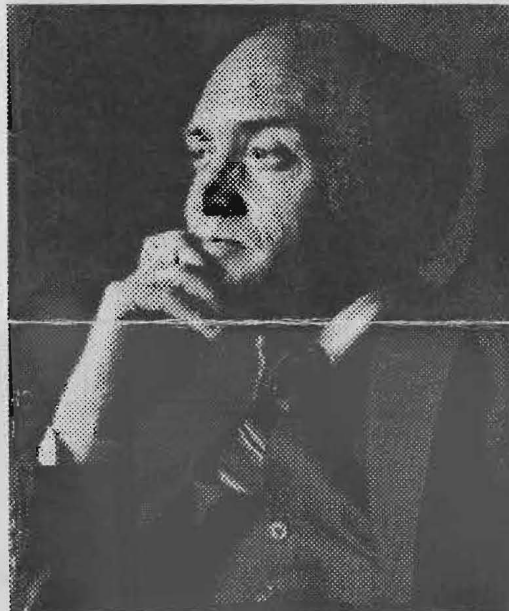

Celebrated pianist and thinker Lorin Hollander made his Carnegie Hall debut at age 11, and has since created one of the most unorthodox careers in classical music. His credits not only list such distinguished orchestras as the Concertgebouw Orchestra and the Chicago Symphony, but also performances in hospitals, reformatories, psychiatric conferences, corporate board rooms, and city streets – including a TV special in which he performed with a Philadelphia street gang. Critics and audiences alike have rewarded Hollander with praise and affection. As the *Symphony Magazine* stated: "Lorin Hollander is an extreme rarity in the music world. He is a highly successful concert pianist who has bypassed the traditional competition circuit."
